

<p>Monday</p> 	<p>Learning Goal: Collects and records data through drawing, writing, dictation, and photographs.</p> <p>Resource: What Comes from an Egg? Everyday Learning</p> <p>Activity: Egg Drop Science Experiment (under Support Materials) • After the experiment you can enjoy the eggs as a snack!</p>
<p>Tuesday</p> 	<p>Learning Goal: Uses vocabulary to describe objects</p> <p>Resource: An Egg is Quiet Between the Lions</p> <p>Activity: Draw an egg in your journal and decorate the shell. Have a grownup help you write two words that describe your design. (example: spotted, blue)</p>
<p>Wednesday</p> 	<p>Learning Goal: Observes that living things differ with regard to their needs and habitats</p> <p>Interactive game: Backyard Birds Everyday Learning</p> <p>Activity: After playing the game, go on a nature walk with your grown-up to observe and listen for birds. Take a picture of your favorite bird. Draw a picture of your bird's habitat in your journal.</p>
